

Legislative Update

•FRPA now includes Section 7 Declaration Act decision-making agreements as an option, integrating Indigenous governance.

Expanded Objectives

•Decision-making agreements can introduce additional objectives for Forest Landscape Plans (FLPs).

Consensus Building

- Consultation and cooperation processes are required.
- •First Nations may formally provide notice of their consent or lack of consent.

Dispute Resolution

•Facilitation is required to resolve disputes.





WHAT IS FOREST LANDSCAPE PLANNING?

Strategic Land Use Planning

Sets legal direction under a cabinet approved land use plan



Strategic Scale

- Is conducted in partnership with Indigenous governments
- Engages local governments, stakeholders and the public in the planning process



Forest Landscape Planning

Sets direction under the Forest and Range Practices Act (FRPA)

Must be consistent with an approved Strategic Land Use Plan



Tactical Scale

- Is conducted in partnership with Indigenous peoples and in collaboration with forest and range license holders under FRPA
- Enables deeper engagement & greater transparency with local governments and stakeholders

Operational/Site-level Planning

Must follow an established Forest Landscape Plan or propose variances to the plan for government approval



Operational Scale

- Promotes cooperation with forest and range licence holders
- Provides the opportunity for all stakeholders and the public to comment on road and cutblock locations

Key Successes

Informing other FLPs:

- Our work and learnings will make adjacent FLPs much easier
- We've built lots of tools and documentation that can be utilized by others

Improved relationships:

- We are inclusive: cultural sensitivity is a strength of the table and therefore we are building trust in the process - relationships are the foundation.
- We are proud that this plan is being built in Quesnel we have local knowledge and local people
- We have had consistent table membership for the most part strong investment in the FLP
- Everyone at the table understands what we are trying to achieve

Establishing an FLP:

- Values are documented and well-understood by the planning committee
- Forest licensees are respectful of the G2G relationship and structure
- Drafter/facilitator (Forsite) has been involved throughout process
- Nations are building consensus internally and with each other

Collaboration and the path towards shared decision making - Governance

Striving for Shared Decision Making and Co-Management - We are not there yet.

- Collaboration and responding to referrals currently
- First Nations access to information
- Implementation of the FLP Forest Operations Plan & cutting permit approvals, amendments
- Steering committee long term for the life of the plan
- Sustained effort over time
- FLP's are one component of all landbase activities
