The City of Quesnel's Forestry Initiatives Program and community partners have been working hard to reduce the risk of wildfires to our community!

Check out the roundup of good news stories and achievements below!



THE FORESTRY INITIATIVES PROGRAM HAS:



- Reached over 6,000 residents for FireSmart outreach and education
- Assessed over 80 homes and buildings for fire hazard, and delivered 26 rebates totaling \$13,000

Created a Community Wildfire Protection Plan which has:

- Assessed over **1,000 hectares** for fuel prescriptions 0
- Enabled over 10,000 hours of community employment 0
- Treated over 112 hectares of public land 0
 - Such as: Ten Mile Lake Provincial Park, Hangman Springs Recreation Site, Sugarloaf Dog Park, and Dragon Lake Hill
- Brought in over \$2 million in provincial funding 0
- Offset \$100,000 in chipping fees for yard 0 waste disposal at the municipal landfill
- Built a new trail system called the Fuel 0 Management Trails for the public to enjoy and learn about wildfire reduction techniques
- Created the Quesnel Fire Mitigation Project 0 to provide free assessments and mitigation activities to replace the United Way Program. To learn more scan the QR code:
